Microsoft Office SR1 Released. If you are currently using Microsoft Office 97, you may want to check out the new Service Release 1 which was just released on Microsoft's web site. The new service release includes a bunch of bug fixes (some of which we have discovered in our classroom sessions!) and a few upgrades. Most notably, Microsoft fixed compatibility problems that were being experienced by users who were converting between Word 6.0 and Word 97 documents. Also added is the Microsoft Access Snapshot which allows you to send a "picture" of a report via Email. Microsoft also added support for Intel's MMX technology to its graphics handling routines. ShortCuts In Windows 95. One of the most asked questions in our training center is "what exactly is a shortcut in Windows 95?" A shortcut is basically an

icon that represents the actual application, but isn't a copy of the application. Think of it this way: the application you want to use (say, Microsoft Word) is located inside of your Microsoft Office folder which itself is in your Programs folder which is on your Start button. You don't want to have to click on all of these folders every time you want to run Word. You just want to make a quick way of running it when you need it. So, you can create a "shortcut" to the icon and place it on your "desktop." The desktop is basically the screen background that all of your other icons sit on. Now, when you want to run Word, you just go to the desktop and click on that application. Creating a shortcut is easy, just find your application's icon in Explorer (or My Computer), and then click-and-drag it to the desktop using the *right* mouse button. When you drop it, you will see a little menu pop up. Click on "create shortcut here" and you're all set. Sharing Files Between Your PCs is relatively easy to do. There are several different methods. The first, of course, is SneakerNet. That's a witty saying for transporting files back and forth on floppy disk. You'll find, however, that doing this often is a pain, and larger files won't fit on floppies. Then, there are several applications available to do direct PC-to-PC transfers. These include LapLink, Carbon Copy, and a host of others (including Windows 95's built in transfer software). This is fine for occasionally transferring a few files, but can be tedious if used on a regular basis. The best solution is to network your systems together. This can be surprisingly inexpensive. All you really need are a couple of network cards (\$30-\$60 a piece), some cable, and the network software (which, if you are using Windows 3.11 for Workgroups or Windows 95, you already have). You can install a network yourself, or you can call professional (such as us) to install it for you.
