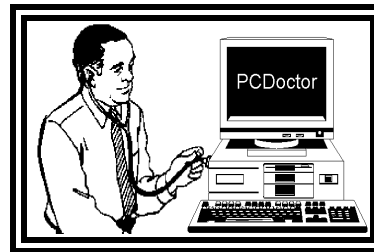
Q: Help! My computer is no longer keeping track of the time properly. Every time I start it, it asks me for the date and time. This is very annoying. What can I do? - *Richard P., Lancaster NY*

A: Most computers have a battery built into them that keeps track of the time. This is called a CMOS (Complementary Metal-Oxide Semiconductor) battery. CMOS batteries generally last several years, but when they die your system's internal clock may be reset each time you turn it off. This is especially true with

older PCs - some of which may even use normal AA or AAA batteries to power the CMOS RAM. Your PC vendor should be able to replace the CMOS battery in your computer. For more assistance, call our HelpDesk at 1-800-283-2255 #20996.

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Q: I recently downloaded a file from America Online. It is named "MWIN95.ZIP" and it will not run on my computer. Can you help? - *Mark F., Buffalo NY*



A: Files that have a ".ZIP" extension cannot directly run on your computer. A ZIP file is an archive

containing many other files which are compressed "inside" of it.

In order to uncompress the ZIP file, you need the program PKUNZIP which comes from PKWare, Inc. This program is Shareware (meaning you can try it for free, and pay later if you want to keep using it) and can be found on most online services and BBSes. You can download it free from our BBS at 716-656-2054.

Once you have PKUNZIP, copy it to your hard drive, and then uncompress your ZIP file by typing **PKUNZIP filename.zip**. This should extract all of the files which are inside the ZIP archive.
