Q: We currently have a small office network, but we don't have a tape drive or any other kind of backup device. What would be the best way to back up our important data without having to use floppy disks each time? > Rick, Buffalo NY

A: The best way, of course, is to simply invest in a tape drive. However, if you really must do without a tape drive, you can make a backup to either (a) other hard drives on your network, or (b) to a second hard drive in your machine. If you want to back up your file server's information to your local workstation, simply make a "batch file" that you can run from Windows or DOS which copies all of the files from your file server (or other network PC or hard drive) to your local drive. The chances of *both* drives failing are much, much less than either failing on its own, and it could be considered a reliable way of making a backup copy of your important data. Q: On occasion, I like to capture a screen in Windows with the PrintScreen key. However, when I go to paste this screen capture in PaintBrush so I can edit it, I lose about an inch on the top and bottom. What can I do to get the whole picture? > Marty, Cheektowaga NY

A: Well, you're still going to lose a *little* bit of the picture, but if you go to the View menu in PaintBrush and click off "Tools & Linesize" and "Palette," then you'll have a bit more space to paste your graphic in. After you've pasted, you can turn those options back on, and you'll still be able to scroll to view your picture. Try it. > *Rick*

TIP: Ever sit there wondering whether or not your computer is "locked up" or is just sitting there thinking, and actually doing something - but you can't tell? Q: Simple question. I have two PCs and I want them to be able to share files, printers, and CD-ROM drives. What do I need? Can I do it myself? What's it going to cost me? > Steve, Tonawanda NY

A: Simple answers, Steve: First of all, you need one network interface card (\$68) for each PC. You will need some kind of peer-to-peer network operating software for each PC. We recommend Windows For Workgroups 3.11 (\$99 or \$49 upgrade). For small (2-10 systems) networks, we recommend thin-coax cable (about \$0.40 per foot). You will also need two line terminators (\$3.50 each) and one "T" connector (\$2.50) for *each* PC (you must use a "T" on each PC or else it won't work - very important). Once you have all this set up and wired together, you have to configure your software to recognize your network cards and share drives/devices. It's something you can do yourself, or you can call us and we can help you hook it up.
