Q: My mouse isn't working. What can I do? > *Bill, Kenmore NY*

A: Bill, it's tough to tell what's wrong with so little information, but we get a *lot* of calls about dead mice, so we'll go through a few of the most common problems. First of all, if you can see some kind of movement, but the mouse works intermittently, you may just need to clean (or replace) it. Open up the underside and pull out the little ball. Clean it good with an alcohol wipe. Look inside at the cylindrical rollers. They may have dust or other junk stuck to them. Take a small screwdriver and scrape it off. This may take you a while, but if you do a good job, you can greatly improve your mouse's performance. Now, if your mouse isn't working at all, you probably have a driver problem, or a hardware problem. Your mouse needs a "driver" to allow it to talk to the rest of your computer. If you're using Windows, you have to load a Windows-based mouse driver. If you're using DOS, you need a DOS driver. Consult the documentation that came with your mouse for what kind of driver you need. There are some standard Windows drivers that you can try, as well. Q: We have a standard company desktop setting for our Windows environments (colors, icons, wallpaper, etc.), and I would like to be able to prevent the other people in my office from modifying this. What can I do? > *Sheryl, Boston NY*

A: It can be a little complicated, but it can be done. What you have to do is edit your PROGMAN.INI file in your Windows directory. At the bottom, add a [restrictions] group, and make the first line

"EditLevel=1" which will prevent users from creating, deleting, or renaming groups. In addition, the New, Move, Copy, and Delete commands will be unavailable if they try to choose them. Make the next line read "NoSaveSettings=1" which will disable the "Save Settings On Exit" feature. This way, even if they change the desktop settings, they will be restored to their originals when Windows restarts. Hope this helps. If you have questions, please call. > *Rick*
