**A:** Nope. It's gone. Check your backup tapes or diskettes (*everyone* is making regular backups, right!?) and hopefully you have the file there. Normally, DOS 6.22 will prompt you and make sure you're sure you want to overwrite the file. If you said "yes" then it's your fault. If you weren't prompted, then you have an old version of DOS, or you will see the line "SET COPYCMD=/-Y"

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in your AUTOEXEC.BAT file. Remove this command to make sure DOS prompts you in the future, to avoid accidentally overwriting files. > Don

**Q:** In one of your previous newsletters, you said that if we needed to boot from a "clean boot" disk, to format it, stick it in the A: drive, and reboot the computer. Well, I made a boot disk, but my system just ignores it and boots off the hard drive! > *Alan*, *Kenmore NY* 

**A:** Some computers may be set to boot from C: first, and then look to A: if C: is not bootable. You can generally change this in your CMOS setup. When most computers boot up, they will display a message like "press DEL for setup." This is how you get into your

CMOS setup. **Warning:** unless you really know what you're doing, stay out of the CMOS setup! Usually in the "advanced options" area, you will find a "boot sequence" option. Change it from "C,A" to "A,C" and this should force your system to boot from A: first. The other option is useful in an office environment where you don't want employees bringing in their own disks (virus problems, etc.) > Rick
