**Q:** I just installed a new software utility on my PC, however now my system won't boot. I turn the machine on, and it sits at the Windows 95 logo screen forever. What can I do? > *Jim, Clarence NY*

**A:** Jim, it sounds like the new utility you installed is not compatible with something on your system. It's probably just a software conflict. Here's what you do: reboot your computer. As soon as you see "Starting Windows 95" press the F8 key. From the menu that appears, select "Safe Mode". This will load Windows without all the supplemental utilities or extraneous drivers you may have installed. Now, go to your Start Button - Settings - Control Panel - Add/Remove Programs. This will allow

Excel. One of them is AutoSave. Install it and you're all set. > *Richard*

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**Q:** I like to save my documents to a C:\DATA folder that I created, however every time I load WordPerfect, it keeps putting me in the "My Documents" folder. How can I change this for good? > *Kathy, Elma NY*

**A:** Kathy, in WordPerfect 7, what you need to do is click on Edit and then select Preferences. From the options that come up, select Files. You will now see a bunch of options. Click on the Document tab across the top. One of the options on that window will be "default file location." Just type in the directory you want documents to always load from and save to in this box, and click OK. For the rest of you, the same applies in Microsoft Word. Just go to Tools - Options - the File Locations tab - and double-click on Documents to change the file location defaults. > *Jason*
