Q: How can I set up my company so that everyone can share a common Internet connection using only one phone line? > *Brian*, *Buffalo*

A: Brian, in order to do this, you need to set up what's called an Internet Proxy Server or Gateway system. This is a computer on your office network that has a modem in it and connects to the Internet. The Proxy Server can be configured to allow multiple users to connect to the Internet, effectively all sharing the same modem. There are many good programs on the market - or available on the Web, including Microsoft Proxy Server, or WinProxy. Q: I have heard a lot about Internet chat rooms. I know they have them out there somewhere. Where are they, and how do I get in? > *Jim*, *Amherst*

A: The most widely used Internet chat is called IRC (Internet Relay Chat). In order to access it, you have to download special software (generally free) from the Web called an IRC client. Once you have this, you can join in on the literally thousands of chat channels available on the Web. For details on how to install IRC, request document **803203**. We'll also tell you how you can join us for **Weekly Tech Chat** every week on IRC. It's a *live* chat session where you can chat with us (the Amicron guys) about any computer-related issues or ask us questions. It's a lot of fun!. >Don

Q: I was told that there is a program available that allows you to automatically update any software on your computer over the Internet. What's this? > Ed, Depew

A: There are several programs/services available on the Internet that allow you to automatically (or through notification) update any software on your computer - such as Microsoft Word, Excel, and so on - with any new patches or updates that become available via the Web. One program we recommend is called *Oil Change*. It will scan your hard drive and then go out to the web and search for any updated software which may be available for you. Q: What's the deal with this *push technology* I keep hearing about? > *Mike*, *Elma*

A: Normally, when you browse the Web, you go out an *pull* information from

the Internet. Now, there are services available which push information to you. You basically select which topics (channels) interest you, and all of the information is automatically sent to your computer when you connect to the Internet. Microsoft Internet Explorer 4.0 (which we don't recommend yet) and PointCast are two programs that offer push technology. We like PointCast. It has lots of news, business, and technology channels that you can let download overnight while you're sleeping - and view them in the morning. How to get it? Request document 803205. >lain
