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9/9/99 Almost Here!

One of the most important dates to the computer industry - almost as important as 1/1/00 itself - is soon to be upon us. That's right folks, September 9th 1999 is a supposed doomsday for computer programs. Why? Back in the ancient days of computing (the 80s and earlier) programmers used "9/9/99" as an easy way to refer to "some far off future date" for a lot of their programs. Part of making sure your computer is "Y2K" safe is making sure it can handle 9/9/99 in addition to four-digit years. Not sure? Check with your software vendor. Q: Can you tell me what the difference is between Microsoft Outlook and Outlook Express? Also is there a way to copy my tasks and calendar between my PC and my laptop for use at home or on the road? > Wayne, Buffalo NY

A: Microsoft Outlook and Outlook Express are primarily designed to send and receive Email. Depending on your version, they also add features such as a calendar, task list, contact manager, and such. One of the major differences between Outlook and Outlook Express is that the latter cannot be used with company LAN mail. It only works with Internet Email. Then again, it's free. To answer your second question, yes, you can carry your data with you. Just click on File > Import And Export or File > Archive and you'll see a whole bunch of options for importing and exporting your data.

Q: Hey! What happened? I thought you were moving on August 1st?

Q: I have written a few documents in Microsoft Word 97 that I would like to give to other people to read. When they try to open the documents, however, they are loaded up into WordPad. What is this, and why doesn't Word load? >Jan, Buffalo NY

A: Jan, WordPad is a free basic word processor that comes with Windows. If you have Windows on your PC, chances are you have WordPad. It will read most Word documents, however some formatting (especially graphics) may be lost. If your files don't load up into Microsoft Word on your associates' computers, chances are they don't have Word loaded. Word is not a free program. You have to buy it (alone, or as part of Microsoft Office). Some PCs are sold with it pre-loaded, which is why you may have it. Your associates can either buy Microsoft Word or you can go to Microsoft's web site at (www.microsoft.com) and download the "Microsoft Word Viewer" which is a separate application you can distribute to your associates for free that they can use to view your documents with their original, exact formatting.

Q: I am starting a new business. What should I buy: an inkjet or a laser printer? I have people giving me conflicting stories either way. > William, Niagara Falls

A: William, it all depends on your printing needs. If you need color at all, you'll need to stick with inkjet (unless you have \$4000 to spend on a color laser printer). For monochrome (black & white) printing, if you see yourself running off more than 100 pages per day, go laser. The up-front cost of a laser printer is higher than an inkjet, but the lower cost per page will save you money in the long run, depending on your print volume, of course. For most new businesses, you can probably forego color and concentrate on printing professional-quality monochrome documents for your business. Inkjet printer quality is good, but nowhere near the crispness of a laser printer.
