A: William, there are a few things you'll have to do. First, you need to clear your History folder when you're done using the PC. We'll assume you're using Internet Explorer 5.0 (if not, you should). Click on Tools > Internet Options. On the General tab, click on Clear History. This will clear your currenthistory. If you don't want the system keeping a history at all, change the "Days to keep pages in history" setting to zero. Q: Yesterday, I received a file in Email over AOL that said it had an attachment in it. It asked me if I wanted to save it and I said "yes." It saved a file called DIRECTIONS.MIM on my desktop. I can't open it, however. Can you tell me how to access this file? >Bob, Hamburg NY

A: Bob, the Email that you downloaded had an archived (compressed) file attached to it. In order to read that archive, you need to install a decompression utility on your system. We recommend a program called WinZip and you can download it from www.winzip.com. Once you've installed WinZip, you can double-click on your file and read it. Most notebook computers come with either a NiMH (nickel metal hydride) or NiCd (nickel cadmium) battery which can build a "memory" and shorten life.
