AMD has done it again. They've released a newer, faster processor, and dropped the pricing on their "slower" chips through the floor. Q: We've discovered something strange on one of the computers in our office. After about a month and a half of continuous operation, the system locks up. We use this system to send and receive faxes, and we tested it - it locks after exactly 49 days of operation. What gives? > Peter, Buffalo

A: We researched this, and surprisingly enough there is a bug in Windows 95 and 98 which can cause some systems to crash after 49.7 days of operation. It turns out that there is a problem with a timing algorithm (file VTDAPD.VXD) which may lock up your system. The good news is that there is a fix on Microsoft's web site. Just go to www.microsoft.com and search for that filename in their knowledge base and you'll find the fix. If you don't know how to do this, give us a call. > Don

Q: When we first got our Windows 98 computer, we had a nice My Documents folder on our desktop. Now, however, it seems to have disappeared. Is there any way we can get that folder back? > James, Orchard Park NY

A: James, all you have to do with Windows 98 is to right-click an empty area on the desktop, point to New, and then click on My Documents Folder on the Desktop. This will re-create the shortcut to your My Documents folder. > Iain

Q: I have a computer that won't boot. Its running Windows 98, and the startup is corrupted. Your technician told me to boot into safe mode by pressing F8 as soon as I see "Starting Windows 98..." but I never see that message. My computer goes right to a blue screen and locks. Is there any other way to get into safe mode? > Ed, Depew NY

A: Ed, you can try this trick: put a **non-bootable** floppy disk in your drive and turn your PC on. When you get the error message "Non-system disk error. Replace and strike any key when ready," press F8 twice and this should put you into the Windows 98 startup menu. If not, give us a call or bring your PC down to our office. > Justin

Q: I accidentally deleted a few buttons off my toolbars in Excel. Is there any way that I can get them back again? > Theresa, Amherst NY

A: Yes, Theresa, there is. All you have to do is right-click on the toolbar in question, select customize, and from the toolbars tab, select the toolbar you want to restore. Click on the "reset..." button and that toolbar will be reset to its original status. If you want to modify your toolbars in the future, we suggest making your own. > Richard
